MORETON BAY OCEAN PADDLE

Date: 13th May

The Brisbane Paddling Club (BPC) held a point-to-point race on Moreton Bay on 13 May 23. Called the Moreton Bay Paddle, the race was the first in the Paddle Queensland (PQ) Pacific Coast Ocean Racing Series.

The distance was 15km, from Nudgee boat ramp to Bells Beach, Clontarf, adjacent to Pelican Park.



The course was designed to help 'river paddlers' transition into open water paddling. Hence, the course had a combination of river and bay legs.

Paddlers were greeted with South Easterly winds gusting up to 20 knots with Luke Chapman taking line honours with a 1:04:29.8 and Elin Hedstroem taking line honours for the women with a 1:24:40.6.




CLUB NEWS

The course was from Nudgee boat ramp to Bells Beach, Clontarf. The weather ranged from sunny to cloudy/overcast with winds generally from the SE gusting up to circa 20 knots, which provided favourable downwind conditions from the 4km turning marker to the finishing line at Bells Beach (11km).

Low tide was around 10:44am and with the race starting at 12:30pm, there was an incoming tide for the first 2.5km.

The number of participants via on-line registration close was 120, with craft ranging from surf ski, ocean ski, ocean ski double, ocean canoe and SUP. There was also a hand-full of registrations on the morning of the race. Participants ranged from the Fraser Coast to the Gold Coast and various clubs in between.

The race timing system was provided by Buck Rogers from Mooloolaba Paddlers. A new system, it was being trialled in anticipation for use at future events. The timing system provided a quick turnaround of race results, allowing for presentations to be within circa 30 mins post the last competitor crossing the finish line. Included at the finish line was a BPC organised 'cash' BBQ, soft drinks and craft wash down facilities. The proximity of these facilities plus the quick turnaround of race results come presentations ensured many competitors remained behind and mingled post-race.



Feedback from the event was positive, both from participants on the day and posts on the club's social media Facebook page post the event. Comments such as a 'great race', 'nice to see a race not being commercialised' through to 'we will be back next year.'

OBLIGATIONS FOR YOUR ORGANISATION

Organisations, business operators and self-employed business operators have obligations under the blue card system.

If you don't comply with these obligations you could face penalties for non-compliance.

You must:

- not start a person in child-regulated work without a valid card
- take reasonable steps to confirm the card holder's identity
- link a card holder when they start with your organisation
- de-link a card holder when they leave your organisation
- maintain a register of the people engaged in your organisation
- develop and implement a child and youth risk management strategy

and

 tell us when there is a change in your organisation's information.

PORTAL POINTERS

New Volunteers to Link?

To enable volunteers to obtain their card for free, they must be linked to the organisation they are proposing to volunteer with.

This can be done in real-time via the Organisation Portal and must be done before they can apply for their Blue Card.

You can use the Organisation Portal to <u>create</u> a <u>link</u> and <u>de-link applicants</u> and card holders.

Blue Card Services

Working together to keep kids safe

Sporting industry

This fact sheet provides information for when people working or volunteering in the sporting industry require a blue card or exemption card under the Working with Children (Risk Management and Screening) Act 2000 (the Act).

Who needs a blue card?

Anyone working or volunteering with children under 18 years of age in activities regulated by the Act **must have** a blue card. This includes various activities such as sport and recreation, clubs, associations, private coaching, or health services

An exemption may apply if a parent volunteers in an activity their child participates in, such as a mother volunteering to coach her child's netball team. However there are a number of scenarios which can apply in the sporting industry. You cannot access an exemption or volunteer within this context if you are a restricted person.

We recommend parents speak directly with the sporting club/executive body to confirm if an exemption applies to their situation before they volunteer.

Examples

The table below provides common scenarios for types of activities typically found within the sporting industry:

Type of	Who must have a blue / exemption card?	Who will not require a blue card?
Churches, clubs and associations involving children*	 A volunteer coach or assistant of a junior sporting team a volunteer trainer preparing nippers for a surf lifesaving competition a chaperone for a junior sports team on an interstate or international trip a volunteer member of a board/committee for a community organisation which provides regulated activities for children such as a president, treasurer or secretary member. a referee or umpire engaged to regularly adjudicate at junior games. 	 A volunteer parent coaching at the club their child attends. You should check with the club before applying. A canteen operator at the sports ground where junior sports are played a team member over the age of 18 in a mixed aged team a coach for an over 18 team which includes a person under the age of 18. a person under the age of 18 volunteering as a coach or acting as an official.
Private, teaching, coaching or tutoring	 A business operator providing private coaching services to children or targeted child-related sports activities, such as learn to swim school or a martial arts centre which trains junior martial artists to compete at junior championships. An instructor or coach regularly providing one-on-one lessons to a child. 	 A relative providing tutoring for a family member an employee of an education provider teaching a fitness course.
Sport and active recreation*	 A volunteer supporting athletes at a junior swimming meet. a personal trainer who is engaged by a parent to provide one-on-one personal training sessions to their child. 	 An employee of a surf school providing services to the general public and a child attends with a parent. A personal trainer running boot camp classes for the general public which includes children and adults.



Fact sheet - Sporting industry

Health, counselling and support services

- An employee of a private ambulance service regularly engaged to attend junior sporting events.
- A remedial massage therapist providing massage services to children.
- A mentor for a coach of a junior sporting organisation and your role is focused on the professional development of the head coach and your duties do not involve contact with children.
- A registered health practitioner providing health services to athletes under the age of 18, such as a physiotherapist treating a junior athlete.

How do I apply for a blue card?

What if I run a business?

Your employees and volunteers **must** have a blue card **before** they can commence regulated child-related work.

Business owners and employers **must** develop and implement child and youth risk management strategies to comply with their legislative requirements.

MASTER PLAN RELEASED FOR EXCITING AND CITY DEFINING BIRKDALE COMMUNITY PRECINCT

Redland City Council has unveiled plans for what will become one of Queensland's largest and most exciting parks, including Redlands Coast's first ever swimming lagoon, and an adventure playground sure to be a hit with local families.

Redland City Mayor Karen Williams said the Birkdale Community Precinct Master Plan that was adopted by Council at its general meeting today focused on giving the 62 hectares of public space back to the community.

"Local families have been crying out for a project like this for years, and Council has listened by creating a Master Plan with the community for the community," Cr Williams said products and services to the paddlesports community.

"Brisbane has South Bank and New Farm Park, Townsville has the Strand and Cairns has the Esplanade, and now Redlands Coast will have Birkdale Community Precinct. "This land was always owned by the community, but it was locked away as a Federal Government communications facility for decades. It is time it was opened up for the community to enjoy.

"After buying the property in 2019 to save it from being used for small-lot housing, Council has spent the last two years engaging with the community to create this exciting Master Plan." Cr Williams said Birkdale Community Precinct struck the perfect balance between the past and future.

"This Master Plan maps out a 20-year journey – so it has specifically been designed with our youth in mind – providing somewhere for kids to play, somewhere local bands will take to the stage and somewhere our youth can meet their friends," she said.

"But just as importantly it also includes some exciting history that will be retained and celebrated, including the restoration of the 1870s Willards Farm, which is expected to begin later this year. Again this property was saved from demolition when Council bought it in 2016.

"We will also be breathing new life into the heritage-listed World War II Radio Receiving Station that sits at the heart of the precinct; delivering an historical precinct that commemorates Redlands' role in the conflict in the Pacific."

Redlands Coast's first public swimming logoon will be a centerpiece for the precinct and for broader recreation, particularly in the summer months, with its surrounding sandy beaches, food carts and open spaces for all visitors to enjoy.


There also will be a further range of paid and free recreational based activities such as an adventure playground and an indoor recreation building for extreme sport opportunities.

A dry-creek bed lined with

extreme sport opportunities. A dry-creek bed lined with natural vegetation will facilitate a link between the resilience training and whitewater facility and the wetlands area. Considerable open space will be maintained for adaptable and flexible usability.

The Hub is home to the Redland Resilience Training Centre, the centre piece of which is the Redland Whitewater Centre.

Redland Whitewater Centre
The state-of-the-art complex
will provide training to people
from around Queensland and
Australia in swiftwater and flood
rescue including emergency
boat operations, and submerged
vehicle rescues. It will also be
capable of hosting international,
national and state athlete
training and events before, during
and long after the Brisbane 2032
Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Cr Williams said the Birkdale Community Precinct Master Plan would ensure Redlands Coast was the focus of international attention as host of Olympic whitewater slalom events during the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

"Knowing the eyes of the world will be on our community thanks to this precinct should provide a real sense of pride for every Redlander. This is your city and thanks to Birkdale Community Precinct we will have the opportunity to show the world why it is the best place to live," she said.

"The whitewater venue is about so much more than the Olympics. It is being specifically designed as a swift-water and resilience training facility that will train emergency service agencies from across the world, meaning the skills perfected at Birkdale could quite literally save lives."

Cr Williams said the Master Plan was rounded out with about 40 hectares of protected environmental land.

"As former farming land there are clearings in the centre of the property where we will build the playgrounds, stages and water play, ensuring the surrounding vegetation is protected," she said. "These areas have tracks and trails where residents will be able to take a stroll to appreciate our naturally wonderful lifestyle.


"We will also build a 2km running track around the perimeter, which will be a huge hit for local running groups."

Division 10 Councillor Paul Bishop thanked the community for their engagement on this important project.

"In the years ahead I look forward to working together with the community to bring the many historic stories of the site to life," Cr Bishop said.


"There are important educational opportunities on this site that help us understand our past in ways that can be appreciated by future generations."
















WELCOME

On behalf of Paddle Queensland, it is my pleasure to welcome you to the Pacific Coast Ocean Racing Series.

The Pacific Coast Ocean Racing Series will bring the Queensland Ocean Racing community together across four events from May to September starting with the Brisbane Paddling Clubs' Moreton Bay Ocean Paddle, the Mooloolaba Paddlers Nordic Kayaks Beach to Beach Ocean Race, the Paddle Queensland 14 Beaches Ocean Race and finishing with the Fraser Coast Regional Councils' Hervey Bay Ocean Classic. The Series will comprise of Male, Female and Mixed classes for Under 19, Under 23, Opens and Masters paddlers on Surf Skis, Spec Skis, Outrigger Canoes, Stand Up Paddle Boards and Stand Up Paddle Foil Boards who will compete for line honours on courses of around 15 km.

As part of the Paddle Australia Canoe Ocean Racing Technical Committees long term strategy, the running of the 2023 and 2024 Paddle Australia Canoe Ocean Racing Championships, as well as the selection of the National Team to represent Australia at the 2024 International Canoe Federation (ICF) Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships has been put on hold whilst an arrangement with Ocean Paddler and the Shaw and Partners Australian Ocean Racing Series (AORS) is explored. This would see the AORS used to crown the 2023 and 2024 Paddle Australia Ocean Racing Champions, as well as selecting the National Team to represent Australia at the 2024 ICF Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships in Madeira, Portugal.

As part of this partnership the Paddle Queensland 14 Beaches Ocean Race will be the first of two Queensland events to be included in the Shaw and Partners Australian Ocean Racing Series in 2023 and 2024.

For 2023 the Paddle Queensland Ocean Racing Champions will be awarded to the top three paddlers based on their final Series ranking. Bonus points will be awarded to paddlers travelling between regions with double points on offer for the 14 Beaches AORS event.

The Paddle Queensland Ocean Racing Series would not be possible without the tremendous support of the following organisations Paddle Australia, Brisbane Paddling Club, Kurrawa Surf Life Saving Club, Mooloolaba Paddlers, the Fraser Coast Regional Council and the Hervey Bay Surf Life Saving Club.

LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT: FOCUS ON CHRIS HURLEY

Over the past decade, the sports industry has undergone a significant transformation, and the role of coaches has become increasingly critical in shaping the success of athletes and teams. As the demand for recreational activities continues to rise, there is a growing need for coaches to help individuals and teams achieve their goals.

However, attracting new coaches can be challenging, especially in a highly competitive market. This changing landscape of sport means that coaches must continually evolve their skills and knowledge to stay relevant and effective.

Chris Hurley's 25 years of coaching experience is a testament to the importance of building the capacity of the coaching network to adapt to the changing landscape of sport.

Initially focused on coaching masters age group paddlers, Chris's coaching role expanded to include junior paddlers in more recent years.

He has been instrumental in preparing several junior paddlers who are now with the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and Australian teams. Chris has also been working with several schools across the Gold Coast to make kayaking a sport option for students through their PE programs. These sessions, which run by school terms, focus on having fun on the water while developing an interest in the sport.

Chris commends the commitment of volunteers at his club in developing programs which inspire new participants to get out on the water. Coaches like Chris, who have been able to evolve and adapt, have played a crucial role in supporting the individual needs of each participant to learn and grow. Building the capacity of the coaching network involves creating opportunities for coaches to develop new skills and knowledge, stay up to date with emerging trends, and exchange ideas and best practices.

Recently, Chris expressed his excitement about the Paddle Australia Learning and Development project, which recognises the importance of coaches in the sport. Through the project, coaches like Chris will have access to a range of resources and training opportunities to develop their skills and knowledge further.

These resources will provide coaches with the tools they need to support their paddlers effectively and help build a stronger coaching network where coaches can share ideas and best practices with each other.

Chris is excited about the roll out of the program, he sees value in using the program to better support junior athletes who are transitioning into coaching positions in his club, providing a function for them to stay involved in paddling.

This approach is an excellent way of ensuring that the club's coaching standards remain high while providing opportunities for younger paddlers to develop their skills and knowledge. One of the key goals of the project is to create connections within the paddling community, both among coaches and between coaches and athletes, to strengthen the coaching network's capacity.

The Paddle Australia Learning and Development Project's focus on creating connections with and between its community is critical to supporting the capacity of the coaching network. By building a more collaborative, supportive, and inclusive coaching network, coaches can feel empowered to develop their skills and knowledge, better support their athletes, and contribute to the growth and success of the sport.

SIGNIFICANT NEW CHANGES TO THE ROLE OF SPORT INTEGRITY AUSTRALIA (SIA) IN COMPLAINTS AND DISCIPLINE

Overview

Please refer to the SIA Fact Sheet (following) for a detailed explanation of these changes, which SIA states are necessary to ensure it is operating within its statutory functions.

In short:

- SIA will only manage complaints related to Child Safeguarding and Discrimination* under the NIF.
- Complaints about other Prohibited
 Conduct under the NIF will be managed
 by the sport at the level at which they arise.

Accordingly, issues at the club level will generally be managed by the relevant club, unless there is a significant conflict of interest which cannot be appropriately managed (eg where the Complaint is made against a club executive or committee member) in which case it will be managed by Paddle Queensland.

- SIA will no longer be involved in the imposition of provisional action (ie protective interim measures) and sanctions.
- * Discrimination is unfair treatment based on a person's: (a) age; (b) disability; (c) race, colour, nationality, ethnicity, or migrant status; (d) sex, pregnancy, marital or relationship status, family responsibilities or breastfeeding; or (e) sexual orientation, gender identity or intersex status.

SIA has affirmed the following process for reporting NIF matters:

 All NIF matters (ie any allegation of Prohibited Conduct under the NIF) may be submitted, in the first instance, via the Paddle Australia online reporting tool.



Paddle Australia will triage and confirm next steps with the person who submitted the report, including the appropriate body to manage the matter.

Alternatively, if preferable, a complaint about Child Safeguarding and/or
 Discrimination may be submitted directly to SIA via the <u>SIA online reporting tool</u>.
 Other issues or concerns may be reported to SIA (which can be done anonymously), however, SIA may not be able to act on them.

Helpdul resources

SIA's <u>Step by Step Guide to Complaints</u> outlines the process by which SIA or the sport will manage complaints.

SIA has provided the following resources to assist paddling organisations with managing NIF complaints:

- Case Categorisation and Sanctions
 Guidelines. The 3-tier case
 categorisation system looks at the nature
 of the alleged conduct, perceived level
 of harm, and complexity, and is designed
 to provide flexibility and efficiency with
 greater focus on preventative strategies.
 The sanctions model provides relevant
 factors and a range of potential sanctions
 for consideration.
- Investigation of Complaints Guidelines.
 This includes advice on the basic mechanics of an investigation, with particular focus on ensuring fair process.
- Bullying in Sport Guidelines.

 This includes a referral guide and summary of available external support pathways.

NATIONAL INTEGRITY FRAMEWORK COMPLAINTS, DISPUTES AND DISCIPLINE POLICY UPDATE

February 2023

Sport Integrity Australia has been working with sports in a review of the National Integrity Framework with feedback informing future Framework policy amendments.

In addition to obtaining feedback from sports, Sport Integrity Australia carried out its own internal assessment of the Framework through the lens of Complaints and Reports it had received. What Sport Integrity Australia identified was a jurisdictional issue regarding its statutory functions, which requires it to focus its member protection activities to align with some of Australia's key international human rights obligations and the Commonwealth's interests in matters such as preventing the abuse of children, as well as discrimination based on features including race, disability, sex, age, and religion.

There are no changes to the Framework's intent or behaviours not acceptable in sport and Sport Integrity Australia will continue to play a vital national coordination role regarding integrity complaints. There are however some necessary changes to the Framework's Complaints, Disputes and Discipline Policy (CDDP) to ensure the agency is operating within its statutory functions.

Under the updated CDDP

Sport Integrity Australia and National Integrity Managers will continue to be involved in investigating all child safeguarding matters and member protection matters based on features including race, disability, sex, age, and religion. This means that Complaints about

Prohibited Conduct under the Child Safeguarding policy or alleged Discrimination under the Member Protection Policy will continue to be managed by Sport Integrity Australia.

It has always been the case that matters outside of the National Integrity Framework and complaints relating to matters such as personal grievances, issues related to employment, governance, eligibility and selection disputes are out-of-scope for Sport Integrity Australia. This is still the case under the updated CDDP. What the jurisdictional issue makes clear is that those Framework matters falling outside of Sport Integrity Australia's statutory functions will now be dealt with by sports or may be referred to external agencies who are established to deal with such matters.

In addition, Sport Integrity Australia will no longer be involved in the imposition of provisional action and sanctions in all National Integrity Framework matters. Rather, Sport Integrity Australia will provide sports with a sanctions framework to help determine appropriate consistent provisional action and sanctions in individual cases. Where Sport Integrity Australia investigates a complaint aligned with a relevant human rights obligation, it will supply a report to the sport with the relevant information to assist sports to determine the appropriate action under the sanctions framework.

Overview of CDDP updates

Sport Integrity Australia has listened and learned. The revised CDDP incorporates feedback received from sport and aligns to Sport Integrity Australia's statutory functions, while retaining the Framework's intent.

- The CDDP has been streamlined to incorporate the governance elements of the previous 'National Integrity Framework' Policy. The previous standalone 'National Integrity Framework' policy no longer exists.
- The CDDP can be utilised by sports or Sport Integrity
 Australia for matters that fall within their respective
 functions. This will assist to create consistency in
 the way matters are managed, regardless of whether
 they are managed by sport or Sport Integrity
 Australia.
- Based on the cases processed by Sport Integrity
 Australia to date, the CDDP now includes a
 Case Categorisation model to provide consistency
 in the way matters can be managed focusing on
 preventative strategies without the need to investigate
 all matters.
- The CDDP provides for sports to make provisional action or sanction decisions in all National Integrity Framework matters.

An awareness of issues with the Framework means the agency must now operate under the updated CDDP, effective immediately. Sport Integrity Australia is also aware that sports will need to follow their processes to sign on to the updated CDDP, but it asks that they do this as quickly as possible to ensure the approach to dealing with integrity matters in sport is as consistent as possible.

Case Categorisation Model

The CDDP introduces a 3-tier Case Categorisation and Sanctions model to provide flexibility in the way matters can be managed, focusing on preventative strategies without the need to investigate all matters.

Category 1 (Blue) matters involve minor allegations of Prohibited Conduct that typically involve a mistake, misunderstanding, or an absence of intent to harm.

A range of sanctions that sports could consider applying:

- · Awareness of NIF policies
- Mandatory awareness and education requirements
- · Formal Warning and/or Reprimand
- Requiring an apology

Category 2 (Amber) matters allege Prohibited Conduct violations and may involve the risk of moderate or reasonable harm, or repeated, more severe or more complex Category 1 allegations. Category 2 matters may involve an investigation, noting the format of the investigation will depend on the complexity of the matter. Written submissions may be suitable for most Category 2 investigations.

A range of sanctions that sports could consider applying (in conjunction with Category 1 measures):

- · Formal conciliation or mediation
- Counselling
- Restricted duties or access
- · Supervision and mandatory oversight.
- Mandatory education and programs
- Temporary suspension from relevant event/ entity/club

Category 3 (Red) matters may involve criminal behaviour and/or immediate risk of harm, and includes child abuse, sexual abuse, sexual misconduct and serious assault. Category 3 matters may need to be referred to law enforcement in the first instance before sport or Sport Integrity Australia can consider the most appropriate action under the CDDP. Category 3 investigations may require a more complex investigation plan and may include formal interviews with Complaint parties.

A range of sanctions that sports could consider applying:

- Formal and mandatory awareness and education requirements
- · Formal Reprimand
- Requiring an apology
- · Formal conciliation or mediation
- Counselling
- Role change/restricted duties or access
- · Supervision and mandatory oversight
- Mandatory education and programs
- Temporary suspension from relevant event/entity/club
- Withdrawal of accreditation from the relevant sporting event
- Permanent suspension /exclusion from the event/entity/club
- · Return of awards

Triaging of matters

Sport Integrity Australia will continue to evaluate any matter it receives in accordance with its statutory functions and the Case Categorisation Model, and will provide advice to sports where possible to assist in determining resolution options.

Complaints currently with Sport Integrity Australia

There are a small number of Complaints currently with Sport Integrity Australia that fall outside its jurisdiction. The Complainant may now choose to resubmit the Complaint to the sport to be managed under their functions.

The Integrity Complaints team will work closely with the Integrity/Complaints managers for the sports that this is relevant to.

National Sports Tribunal

The following information has been provided by the National Sports Tribunal (NST).

For all NST Eligible matters*, sports may refer matters to the NST:

- to review decisions regarding Provisional Action
- to refer the Complainant and Respondent to Alternative Dispute Resolution, and
- to facilitate a Hearing Tribunal to arbitrate
 Provisional Action or Alleged Breach and determine
 whether a Sanction should be imposed and if so,
 the Sanction.
- *An NST Eligible matter is an alleged breach that is a kind of dispute that falls within the jurisdiction of the NST (See NST Act sections 5(2) and 6(2) and NST Rule section 7)

It is not required that an investigation be undertaken before a matter is referred to the NST. As part of the NST dispute resolution process, parties may submit evidence and make submissions. In Alternative Dispute Resolution, this assists the parties to understand the position of the other. In Arbitration, this assists the Tribunal to understand the background to the dispute and through the arbitration hearing, review the evidence provided by each party, and come to a conclusion. If there has been an investigation, that becomes part of the evidence for the Tribunal to consider.

Evidence describes the factual information which a party will rely on and may be in various forms including a statement, a document, or an expert's or investigator's report. The evidence required will differ from case to case and will not always be lengthy. Submissions summarise the relevant facts, the relevant policy (and alleged breaches), the relevant law (if necessary), and the relevant outcomes sought, and include a proposed analysis to bring them together.

Please discuss any questions you have in this regard with the NST.

Support and resources for sport

Sport Integrity Australia will continue to play a coordination role for complaints. Complaints received will be evaluated and either managed by Sport Integrity Australia, referred on to an appropriate external agency or passed back to the complainant with suggested pathways for them to pursue.



BRISBANE 2032 CANOE SLALOM VENUE GETS COUNCIL APPROVAL

A cutting edge canoe slalom venue built for the 2032 Brisbane Olympics but designed to provide a community facility for decades to come has been approved by the local council.

The Redland City Council approved the Birkdale Community Precinct master plan, a two-decade transformation of local parkland into a major event and tourism destination. A whitewater facility which would host canoe slalom and kayak cross at the Brisbane Olympics forms part of the plan.

The International Canoe Federation leadership team visited the site earlier this month and was impressed by the vision and the passion of the Redlands Council.

Mayor Karen Williams said she was confident the precinct would become the ultimate example of Olympic legacy. "This place with a space for everyone will not only deliver recreational opportunities, but also health and wellbeing opportunities," she said. "Our young people are really tired of Redlanders missing out and being told no. I think it's time for our young people to experience what is really precious about our community."



The council's major projects general manager, Chris Isles, told the council meeting the community could reasonably expect the whitewater venue to break even or make a profit. "A lot of commentary has been made in the public around a handful of them [Olympic whitewater venues] that have closed," he said. "Those were built as stand-alone venues in the middle of an Olympic park or the middle of nowhere with no other compelling reason to bring people to those precincts."

ICF President Thomas Konietzko congratulated the council for its foresight and vision. "The time and effort the council has put in to ensuring this venue will benefit the local community both before and after the Olympics, and also that it will embrace cutting edge technology to lessen its environmental impact, has been inspiring," he said. "We stand ready to support the Redlands Council, the local community and the Brisbane 2032 leadership team in ensuring this will be one of the most exciting venues during the Games, and will also provide a local legacy for decades to come."



2023 OCEAN RACING WORLD TITLES TAKING SHAPE

Excitement is already starting to build ahead of this year's 2023 ICF Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships in Perth, Western Australia. The world titles will wrap up the ICF's international calendar for 2023. The scenic Perth coastline and the reliable downwind conditions will guarantee world class fields and top shelf ocean racing.

ICF LAUNCHES ENVIRONMENT TOOLKIT ON WORLD WATER DAY

The International Canoe Federation has taken the next step towards becoming a carbon neutral sport by releasing sustainability guidelines to help event hosts reduce their carbon footprint and preserve biodiversity.

The ICF chose World Water Day to officially launch its Events Sustainability Toolkit. Access to clean water is integral to the success of canoe sports all over the world, and the ICF is keen to play its part in raising awareness of water issues.

The Sustainability Toolkit provides a roadmap for all ICF event organisers to help them run events that have a minimal impact on the environment. Many events are already working hard to make a difference, but ICF vice-president Cecilia Farias said more needs to be done. "As a global sport, we have many challenges when it comes to lessening our impact on the environment, but we are not afraid to step up for the fight," Dr Farias said. "There are so many simple steps we can take which will straight away make a difference. And the toolkit also outlines some of the steps we can take that are more challenging, but can make an even bigger difference."



The toolkit provides a checklist of measures every event organiser will be encouraged to embrace, ranging from transport and waste management, to energy supplies and food and beverage options. The toolkit also has recommendations on how to encourage diversity and inclusion at events, and how to protect local biodiversity.

"The international canoeing community is very passionate about protecting the environment, so I am confident all event organisers will welcome this toolkit," Dr Farias said. "We are launching this initiative on World Water Day, because clean and safe water is integral to the success of our sport. Clean waterways play such an important part in ensuring communities can get access to safe water. "Every day our athletes, coaches and team officials see first hand the state of waterways around the globe. They are passionate about making a difference, and this toolkit will help us achieve this."

FREESTYLE WORLD TITLE BULLETIN ONLINE

ONLINE COACHING COURSE TO BOOST CANOE SPRINT

The International Canoe Federation will once again conduct it's world-leading online level three sprint coaching course which will be open to coaches all over the globe.

The course will once again be run in partnership with the Hungarian University of Sports Science, and offers coaches a unique opportunity to access the best canoe trainers. The course will run from September 18 to November 26 and has the goal of improving the knowledge, skill and competencies of participating coaches.

The Sprint Canoeing Online Level 3 Coaching Course will focus on theoretical, technical and practical aspects of coaching, equipping them to take responsibility over a team of coaches.

The 10-week online course will be broken into five two-week core subjects;

- 1. Training theory and methodology
- 2. Sports Psychology
- 3. Sport nutrition
- 4. Sport pedagogy
- 5. Sport injuries

Each module will include classroom instruction, sport-specific presentations,

and demonstration of practical activities. There will be home assignments and independent study will be required.

The Sprint Canoeing Online Level 3
Coaching Course program is taught and run exclusively in English. Participants are expected to communicate at a reasonable level. The course will finish with an online test. "The ICF Sustainable Development Program continues with an education programme that intends to reach the five continents at the best academic level," ICF vice-president, Dr Cecilia Farias, said. "We work in partnership with Hungarian University to ensure that well prepared professionals will access and consume all the necessary knowledge which will help them improve our sport at all levels." -

Graduates of the program receive the "Sprint Canoeing Level 3 Coaching Course" certificate. This coaching certificate is registered and endorsed by the International Canoe Federation and issued by the Hungarian University of Sports Science. The Hungarian University of Sports Science is the largest, the most comprehensive and the oldest centre for education and training in sport in Hungary with 98 years of history, originally established as the Royal College of Physical Education in 1925.

MORE DETAILS RELEASED FOR 2023 SUP WORLD TITLES

Organisers of this year's International Canoe Federation Stand Up Paddling World Championships in Thailand have announced the location for each event.

The total prizepool for the event has also been confirmed, with 30k Euro set to be shared among the placegetters.

The technical and long distance races will be held on Pattaya's famous Jomtien Beach, where the accreditation centre and closing ceremony will also be located. The official event hotel, the D Varee, is also located at Jomtien Beach.

The sprint races and the opening ceremony will be held at the Rowing and Canoeing Association of Thailand (RCAT)
Training Centre.

The timetable for the world championships has also been released, with sprint opening the program on Friday, the technical races on Saturday, and the long distance and inflatable races will be held on the Sunday.



Registrations for the world championships will open on June 1, and close on November 5. Airport transfer services, board rentals and transportation services will all be offered, and there is also a plan to arrange a shipping container to bring boards and equipment from central Europe to Pattaya.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE AND ATTORNEY GENERAL

Gambling Community Benefit Fund:

The Gambling Community Benefit Fund (GCBF) is Queensland's largest one-off community grants program and distributes approximately \$60 million each year to not-for-profit community groups.

The GCBF funding helps these groups to provide services, leisure activities and opportunities for Queensland communities.

In 2023, the GCBF program has 4 funding rounds available:

- 1. \$100,000 super round for all priorities closes 28 February
- 2. \$35,000 standard grant round closes 31 May
- 3. \$35,000 standard grant round closes 31 August
- 4. \$35,000 standard grant round closes 31 October.

To check eligibility requirements and understand your organisation's responsibilities read the guidelines for GCBF applicants and instructions for applying for the GCBF grant. Updates will be on Facebook when the next round is open. The outcome of a funding application may take up to 4 to 5 months after the closing date.

SUNSHINE COAST COUNCIL

Major Grants:

Project funding for not-for-profit community groups up to \$15,000, and up to \$30,000 for infrastructure projects. The next major grant round opens on 17 July 2023 and closes on 28 August 2023.

Minor Grants:

Project funding for not-for-profit community groups up to \$2000. The next minor grant round opens 18 September and closes on 30 October 2023.

Discretionary Grants Program:

The Discretionary Grants Program is allocated funding each financial year to support community organisations to deliver projects primarily intended to benefit a particular divisional area and its residents.

The Discretionary Grants Program is offered once a year with applications opening late August. Opening dates will be published on this page in the 2023-24 financial year.

Community Event Grants Program:

The Community Event Grants Program (including annual community events) is a divisionally based program that allocates funding each financial year to support community organisations to deliver divisional/local events that are open to the public and are in the public interest.

Applications for the Community Event Grants Program are currently open and are accepted and assessed on an ongoing basis. Please note that funding allocated may be exhausted prior to the end of the financial year.

Note: Applications must be received at least one month prior to the event date to allow time for processing.

Community Facility Grants Program:

The Community Facility Grants Program allocates funding each financial year to support the delivery of capital projects on Council-controlled land where a community organisation holds a lease or licence.

Applications can be either for shovel ready projects, or "seed" funding for conceptual ideas to fully scope, plan, design and obtain cost estimates for a future project.

The Community Facilities Grants Program is a rolling program with applications accepted throughout the year, subject to funds being available. Please note there are two application forms; one for confirmed projects, and one for funding to investigate and plan for a future project.

MORETON BAY REGIONAL COUNCIL

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
